Compact raises standards for service users

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Service users are benefiting from closer relationships between ASBAH and the local associations developed through the Compact agreement.

The Compact, launched in 2005, was developed following a yearlong consultation with local associations throughout England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The aim was to improve standards both at The need for ASBAH and within the local associations, to benefit everyone involved, particularly those with spina bifida and hydrocephalus, their families and carers.

Three years on and 17 local associations have signed up to the Compact and are enjoying the benefits of being under one ASBAH umbrella.

ASBAH's Chief Executive Andrew Russell said: "The need for local contact and support is as important now as it was for founder members of the local associations back in the 1960s.

"We all share the same aims and these form the basis of the Compact between ASBAH and the local associations, which we have found very helpful to communication over the last three years."

Your comments

"Surrey felt the development of the Compact would be useful in bringing the local associations closer to national ASBAH.

"We have benefited by receiving help producing leaflets and we have recently been offered a tailor-made CD with logos on for use on our literature and our website.

"It is good to know that ASBAH is there if we need help and support but I would like to see ASBAH being more proactive in its work with local associations.

"For example when people in the Surrey area call the Helpline it would be useful if they were given details of the local association and its website."

Helpline Manager Linda Lewis replies:

"The helpline team work hard to find solutions

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for anyone contacting the service. Our aim is to provide callers with the information they need and signpost them to other sources of help, including local associations.

"We do give out contact details of local associations in their area, and also include the Surrey (or other) Local Association leaflet, when sending our information leaflets in the post, but we have learned that providing callers with information doesn't necessarily mean they will follow it up."

"The Compact Agreement has brought us closer to the national charity, we now work together more effectively for the benefit of our members."

"We decided to sign up to the Compact because of our desire to ensure that our activities complemented those services offered by other Associations and by ASBAH itself, in terms of the way in which we go about our business and measure our effectiveness.

"It effectively gave us a set of guidelines that, if followed, would ensure best practice.

"But we didn't necessarily need the Compact to ensure a close relationship with ASBAH - this has always been good.

"For some time we had debated revising our rather dated logo and coming into line with ASBAH's logo. We waited until the new ASBAH template was ready for local Associations to use before going live with our new logo that we will launch in April this year.

Support group welcomes all

A Dunstable-based support group is still going strong after an impressive ten years.

The group, which meets up on the second Monday of every month, welcomes anyone – children included - who have spina bifida and/or hydrocephalus.

Lorraine Watson from the Herts and South Beds local association, said: "Sometimes someone comes to give a talk or we just have a general chit chat amongst ourselves... and of course there's always tea and biscuits. John Richards, our area adviser, also attends most of our meetings.

"There's no membership, it is just a drop-in group and we're always delighted to see new faces."

The group meets on the second Monday of every month from 1pm to 3pm at The Disability Resource Centre, Poynters Road, Dunstable.



New networking scheme could help you

Some local associations have intimated that they would like to have some way of networking informally – to air ideas for fundraising; ask others how they have organised an event; discuss what has, or hasn't worked well as a social outing etc.

To try to facilitate this, Gill Winfield, ASBAH's Marketing and Communications Manager, suggests an email forum. Gill would act as the contact point and forward emails to others who join the network.

Even if your association doesn't have an official email address, you could join if a committee member is willing to use their personal email to receive/send messages.

If any items arise that might be suitable for inclusion in *Connect* or *Link*, Gill will follow these up with the originator.

Like many local associations, Surrey ASBAH covers a wide geographical area - basically the county of Surrey plus the London Boroughs of Croydon, Hounslow, Kingston, Merton, Richmond and Sutton.

We also have a wide spectrum of members including parents with babies, young families and adult service users, so finding activities to interest everyone can be a bit of a challenge.


Working towards disability equality

Last year in Connect we asked local associations - along with YV members - to send us their views to feed into ASBAH's response to a consultation on disability equality.

The Office for Disability Issues (ODI) wanted to focus on what equality means to disabled people and ASBAH was able to use the direct experience of those with SB/H in its submission to the ODI.

Responses to the consultation helped the ODI to develop a set of measures that will be used to find out if changes being made by government lead to improvements to disabled people's lives.
