## FOLIC ACID IN FLOUR

THE NEW Food Standards Agency discussed fortifying flour with the vitamin folic acid at its meeting in May. This followed ASBAH intensifying its efforts to focus government attention on the vitamin.

For more than a decade, folic acid has been known to help prevent babies developing spina bifida and anencephaly. It is now known that folic acid also helps to prevent heart disease and strokes and, possibly, bowel cancer.

ASBAH has been pressing the government and the previous Conservative government, to make it compulsory for flour millers to add a small amount of folic acid to white flour. Flour is already fortified with calcium and iron, as a public health measure, so there are clear precedents.

### ACCESS TO PUBLIC TRANSPORT

SINCE April, some disabled people have been able to travel free on local buses in Wales. However, not all buses are yet adapted to afford access and many people are therefore unable to take advantage of the scheme. Ken Mack, from Wrexham, offers this piece of advice.

'On 6 March 2002 I took this matter up with Dr John Marek AM, requesting to know if a voucher system could be introduced for those who are missing out, enabling them to use alternative modes of disability-adapted transport such as taxis. He in turn wrote to Sue Essex,

Minister for the Environment, who replied on March 25:

LICENCE holders who have had third ventriculostomy are individually assessed on the best time they can start driving again.


The first step is for the licence holder or their GP to inform DVLC Swansea about having had surgery. The individual may inform them by phone, but the GP (or any third party) must do so by letter. The licence holder and the GP then receive a medical

# DRIVING THEORY PRACTICE

BSM driving school is offering an online facility for disabled people to practice answering their driving theory test.

The system presents a random selection of 35 multiple choice questions from the Driving Standards Agency list of 1,000 and shows whether the learner would have achieved a pass - which requires 30 correct answers.

It costs £5.99 for a month's access and allows an unlimited number of attempts at the questions.

"I know that for a number of years some authorities in Wales have offered alternative arrangements where conventional buses do not provide the level of service we would wish. The Transport Act 2000 retains this flexibility, so that a person eligible to receive the new minimum standard may agree with the local authority that, for example, he or she receives tokens as an alternative"

In the Minutes of Questions to the First Minister in the Welsh Assembly on April 16, First Minister Rhodri Morgan said in reply to a question from Janice Gregory AM:

"Disabled people can not only get a free bus pass, they can opt for vouchers if they are too disabled to access buses. That is their decision."

I would urge all aggrieved people with mobility disabilities who qualify for the concessionary travel pass scheme and who cannot access buses because they are not adapted and who live in the Principality to apply to their local councils for tokens or vouchers. If these people receive a negative response from their local councils, then I would suggest that they write in the first instance to either the First Minister, Rhodri Morgan, or Sue Essex, Environment Minister at National Assembly of Wales, Cardiff Bay, Cardiff CF99 1NA
